Objectives

Plenary Sessions

- Describe how the requirement of compatibility between donors and recipients has rapidly evolved over the years.
- Explore how a coordinator's personal experience with living donation has impacted her care of living donors and their recipients.
- Discuss the influence of ESRD on live kidney donation.
- Identify professional boundaries and the challenges they present to living donors, their caregivers, and the live donor team.
- Understand the unique needs of diverse donor populations.
- Describe evidenced based strategies to increase living donation.
- Identify and discuss strategies to manage challenging transplant candidates through the living donation process, and explore approaches to cope with donors identified through solicitation and social media.
- Describe legislative issues in living donation.
- Discuss effective communication between living donor and transplant candidate team members.

Foundational Track

- Outline the live donor process from intake through long term follow-up.
- Discuss CMS and OPTN/UNOS regulatory requirements for living donor programs.
- Discuss QAPI as it pertains to the Living Donor Team.
- Describe the surgical evaluation and procedure for a Living Donor.
- Outline the financial considerations for living donation.
- Describe the medical evaluation of the living donor, including assessment of short and long term risks.
- Identify elements of the Independent Living Donor Advocate Interview.
- Identify elements of the donor psychosocial assessment.
- Identify the basic principles related to histocompatibility that apply to living donor transplantation.

Advanced Track

- Discuss three important variables in the assessment of addiction in the living donor and how this might impact donor candidacy.
- Distinguish important criteria for legalized use of cannabis.
- Discuss strategic programmatic processes to manage a living donor serious safety event or sentinel event.
- Discuss non-directed living kidney donation and its impact on transplantation.

Liver Track

- Discuss whether living donor liver transplant should be the first or last option for best outcomes.
- Describe ethical and psychosocial considerations for live donor selection with a recipient with fulminant hepatic failure.
- Review how the medical evaluation differs for a donor for a fulminant hepatic failure.
- Discuss the necessary resources for a liver program including new liver policies.
- Describe how the anatomy of the Liver affects donor and recipient outcomes.


KPD Track

- Discuss cost benefit analysis for KPD.
- Discuss the clinical outcomes for patients involved in KPD.
- Describe the logistics and resources need for internal and external KPD.
- Identify and discuss the process for advanced matching concepts within KPD.
- Outline KPD education and consent processes.
